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Avondale Celebrates the Life of Rev. Clarence Wallace

Rev. Clarence Wallace was Giant in Avondale

Rev. Clarence Wallace, who was pastor of Carmel Presbyterian Church in Avondale for 34 years and one of the community's most active civic leaders, died Sunday, Dec.16, at his home in Mt. Airy after battling prostate cancer for the past two years. He was 63.

"Rev. Wallace was a gentle giant," said Patricia

Milton, president of the Avondale Community Council. "He was always at community meetings to represent the faith-based community in Avondale and worked with the Community Council for years. We called on him often.

"He believed that people are the most

important component of the community," Milton continued, "and he invested his ministry in the people of the community. He was dedicated to the community although he did not live in it. And he got things done. Those of us who knew him know he is in a good place now, looking down and smiling for us to continue on," Milton said.

"I've known Rev. Wallace since I was 14 years old," said Sen. Eric H. Kearney (D-Cincinnati). "He was a great man – a dedicated pastor and family man, and a fantastic community leader." Kearney talked about Rev. Wallace's involvement in bringing the vision for the Avondale Towne Center into a reality, and many of the church's programs for youth, such as the popular summer enrichment camp.

"Rev. Wallace often brought community leaders together to address difficult problems such as racial tension in the city, violence in the community, food deserts in Avondale, and other issues. He pushed for action plans, and encouraged involvement."

One of the Carmel Presbyterian's biggest efforts has been working since 2006 with the Every Child Succeeds program, an initiative developed through founding partners Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center, United Way of Greater Cincinnati and Cincinnati-Hamilton County Community Action Agency/ Head Start.

"I don't think we would be where we are today without the support of the church," said Anita Brentley, Med, MPH, clinical quality assurance coordinator for Every Child Succeeds and project team leader for the Avondale Every Child Succeeds home visitation partnership. In addition to providing office space for the program, Carmel houses a pantry of baby and toddler supplies to help families in crisis, Brentley said. "He was a visionary, teacher and a good friend," she added. "His passing is a huge loss for the community and the city, and he will truly be missed."

Judith B. Van Ginkel, PhD, President of Every Child Succeeds, said Rev. Wallace was germane to that organization's work with families in Avondale. "Every Child Succeeds went to Rev. Wallace when it started six years, and he has always been there with his leadership and support," she said. "He did a wonderful job of engaging other churches, and we have 70 organizations that are involved." The model Rev. Wallace helped develop at Carmel is being used in other communities, she said.

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"The longevity and continued presence of the pastor is key for communities in transition," said the Rev. Jerry Cannon, pastor of C.N. Jenkins Presbyterian Church in Charlotte and formerly a church specialist serving the African American Congregational Support office. "Dr. Wallace has become a reliable presence to the city of Cincinnati."

Rev. Wallace once said in an interview that through the years the church could easily have left Avondale and moved to the suburbs, "but it chose to stay."

Rev. Wallace said, "Carmel Presbyterian wants people to know you are loved here. We want you to be a part of us, and then together the community can be transformed."

He said in a Presbyterian Mission Agency interview, "Our ultimate aim is to let people know that the church of Jesus Christ is alive and well, and that Jesus is not just preaching on Sunday," he said. "Jesus embraces, loves, cares, and supports."

Ozie Davis III, MS, JD, Executive Director of the recently formed Avondale Comprehensive Development Corporation, said Rev. Wallace was a hero and mentor to him. "I'm devastated with the loss of Rev. Wallace. The fact that he stayed at Carmel Presbyterian for more than 30 years was a signal of his commitment to the neighborhood and his church family."

Former Carmel Elder Emily Spicer, who has been a member of the church for about 60 years, said of Rev. Wallace, "He was an endearing man who was always there for you." She added, "He was a good preacher and teacher, who really knew the Bible and the history of the church."

Rev. Wallace was not only her boss but her best friend, said Sharon Evans, office manager at Carmel for 24 years. He was involved in about anything that went on civic wise in Avondale and sat on a number of organizations' boards, she said. "However, in all the things he did in the community, he never sought the limelight," she said.

Rev. Wallace was born in Charlotte, N.C. He earned a masters degree in divinity from Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary in Atlanta. He was called to pastor Carmel in 1987 at the age of 29. He had been working as an ordained minister as an alcohol and

substance abuse counselor in Charleston, S.C., prior to coming to Cincinnati.

He is survived by his wife, Jacqueline Wallace; daughters Angela Sroufe of Tampa, Fla., and Allison Wallace of Atlanta, Ga.; four grandchildren and a great grandchild.

\$29.5M HUD Choice Grant To Renovate Avondale Housing

The Community Builders Inc. (TCBI) received a 29.5 million dollar, five year grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to renovate five distressed affordable housing projects on Reading Road. The five apartment complexes to be renovated are:

- Crescent Court-3179 Reading Road
- Alameda Apartments –3580-86 Reading
- Maple Apartments-631 Maple Avenue
- Poinciana– 3522 Reading Road
- Somerset Manor-802-14 Blair Avenue

Community Builders, Inc. is also hoping to expand the Avondale Town Center to bring in additional retailers and return a grocery store to Avondale. In addition to rehabbing the five existing buildings, the developer plans to build new housing near the intersections of Burnet and Forest Avenues.
